ello, and welcome back to The Acretweed Stadium

this afternoon; welcome to our supporters new and old, and to all connected with Ashford Town (Middlesex) FC; we trust they enjoy their stay with us, and have a safe journey home later.

The Woods first met Ashford Town in an away Middlesex Intermediate Cup tie back in December 1974 (a 2-1 Northwood win, incidentally!), when we played in the Middlesex League and Ashford were in the Surrey Intermediate League. Most fixtures between the clubs have, though, been since the Millennium, and overall, results have been pretty even – of 23 competitive games, Northwood have won nine, Ashford six, with eight draws. Fortunately, though, today's Bostik League game cannot go to penalties – over the years we have three times lost to them in a shoot-out!

Since the last home game, a disappointing 2-2 draw against South Park after the Woods had held a two-goal lead and looked comfortable, we have exited from the Velocity Trophy, going out 3-1 to Felixstowe & Walton United, a round-trip in excess of 200 miles, but we had a blank Saturday last week.

That day, however, it was announced that the club had parted company with first team manager Dean Barker. We thank him for the positive impact that he had brought to the club in the past months, and wish him well for the future. Assistant manager Scott Dash and coaches Kevin Lawrence and Richard Elderfield agreed to take first team training this week, as well as this afternoon's match, and we wish them all well!

Next up for the Woods is a Middlesex Senior Cup tie at Harrow Borough on Tuesday evening. Next Saturday's scheduled away game at Bedfont Sports has been postponed as we have two, possibly three, players who will be travelling to the Falklands Islands with the FA XI this week; a great honour for the players and our club, of course. Hertford Town are our next opponents here, on Saturday 17th November, kick-off at 3.00 p.m.

Thanks for your support this afternoon, enjoy the game, and we hope to see you at the Acretweed Stadium again soon!

There is certainly a base for an incoming Manager to work from, but with the usual vultures circling, the playing squad may look a little different today. Always amazes me how players get 'touted' around in these circumstances. You decide how this happens....

Scott, Kevin and Richard have stepped in and have taken training this week and the match today. My thanks to them for their help.

Off the pitch (but close to it), we have just replaced the pathway behind the near goal at considerable expense as it was in a bad state of repair. We also need some electrical work carried out and we have to change the structure in our changing rooms to meet FA requirements for next season. We are just about 1.3 square metres short in the changing area of the rooms and 1.5 square metres short in the Officials room. We go to some woeful facilities in this division, but as the rooms are big enough, they are fine! The crazy world of football.

Club Matters

Management Change

Last Saturday the club parted company with Manager Dean Barker after five months in charge of the first -team. With virtually a new squad and a large management team alongside him, the Woods played 18 matches under Barker, holding a mid-table position, winning eight games and losing seven including the cup competitions. There were plenty of positive contributions during that period and I certainly enjoyed working with him, even though I had to do plenty of mileage in signing on some players in recent times! It appears that head coach Ben Andreos has chosen to leave with him, as has goalkeeping coach Chris Stead, who only joined in the last month. We wish them all every success at wherever football takes them in the near

Assistant Manager Scott Dash has stayed with the club and will take charge of the side in the interim period while we decide where we go next and he will be working with the club's own Richard Elderfield and goalkeeping coach Kevin Lawrence this afternoon. The role of first team manager has been advertised and we

will look to consider those over the next week or so. In the meantime we will be fully behind Scott and his team, and I wish them all the best as they look to make a strong case for the job themselves.



Other Cup Competitions

After our recent defeats in the Buildbase FA Trophy at Dunstable Town and the Velocity Trophy at Felixstowe & Walton United, we now only have the County Cup competitions to look forward to throughout the remainder of the season.

We triumphed in the opening round of the Middlesex Charity Cup, following a 0-0 draw at Bostik Premier side Wingate & Finchley, with a 5-3 success on penalties; scoring every attempt in that shoot-out. The draw for the next round of the competition has given us a home tie against one of two Spartan South Midlands League Division One sides – either Enfield Borough or Harefield United. As that game hasn't taken place yet, we obviously have no date fixed yet for our match against the winners so watch the website for confirmation. The Hares will be favourites to win the game as they have established themselves as title favourites in recent weeks and also beat us to the signature of former QPR striker Richard Pacquette – son of former Woods striker Henry just last week.

We also moved into the second round of the Middlesex Senior Cup a few weeks ago with a comfortable 3-0 success at AFC Hayes and the next round comes up very quickly as we are due to make the short journey to neighbours Harrow Borough on Tuesday night, 6th November 2018. Harrow faced the shock of a switch away from their familiar Isthmian League home this season and now compete in the Southern League Premier Division South but they have coped admirable and currently sit in seventh place in the table with 18 points from 11 games, so it will be a real test for the Woods on Tuesday. It would be good to have as many of you there as possible to give the side some support. Kick-off is at 7.45 p.m.

FA Representative Honours

Later this week, the Football Association is taking an FA XI squad to make an ambassadorial visit to play a game on the Falkland Islands and the Club is honoured



to have players included in that squad which is made up mainly from clubs at our level. Club Captain Carl Pearce will be joined by recent signing Brendan Ocran and possibly striker Ben Pattie (who is in the standby contingency squad) as they assemble on

Wednesday 7th November and they return to Brize Norton the following Tuesday after the 16,000 mile round trip to the UK Overseas Territory just south of South America. It's a truly once in a lifetime opportunity for footballers at our level to represent their country's Football Association and we hope they have a brilliant time while representing our club with honour both on and off the field.

With up to three players missing, it also makes history for Northwood FC, as we have had to postpone our scheduled away game at Bedfont Sports, which was to be played on next Saturday, 10th November, due to "international call-ups"! Not confirmed by the League as yet, it seems this match will be rescheduled to Tuesday 27th November – kickoff at 7.45p.m.

Fergus Moore – And Sometimes the Dog Was Busy!

Fergus Moore is well-known for his long playing career on the local non-League scene which included a spell here at Northwood Park between 2004 and 2006 when he made 78 appearances and scored four goals from a defensive position in our Southern Premier League era. He is currently at Edgware Town in a player-manager role at the ripe old age of 46.

Well Fergus, with the assistance of Roger Slater (who previously helped Gordon Bartlett to

pen his non-League story), has compiled his own football memories which will be published in his own forthcoming biography, And sometimes, the dog was busy! The book is a meander through his career and the things he has seen in twentyeight years in the nonleague game including that two-year period at Northwood. It should be an interesting read.

The home side were then reduced to ten men and the Woods took full advantage with Callum Bedwell and Ollie Lawford both netting their first goals for the club to make it 4-2 and then they held on despite conceding very late in the game.

Unfortunately fortunes went the other way last Thursday when another Ollie Lawford strike put the Woods 1-0 ahead against Potters Bar Town and after they equalised, Jamie Fulton was sent-off after picking up two yellow cards and the visitors then ran out 1-3 winners.

Wealdstone will have had a chance for revenge a couple of nights ago as they were due to visit the Acretweed Stadium in the return fixture but these notes had to go to print before the result of that fixture was known. The Woods next game is here on Thursday 15th November, when we play hosts to Uxbridge in the Middlesex Senior Youth Cup – Kick-off: 7.45 p.m.

ASHFORD TOWN (Middx)



Intil recently, it was assumed that Ashford Town was formed in 1964. However, new research has indicated the club started as Ashford Albion in 1958 and first competed in the Hounslow & District League. Albion won two consecutive promotions to reach the Premier Division of the Hounslow League and were still competing at this level when the club changed its name to Ashford Town in 1964. The club endured a difficult first campaign as the Town club and withdrew from the Premier Division, assuming the Reserve Team's place in Division Two.

Having rebuilt the club with a very young team, Ashford Town rapidly advanced through the various divisions of that League, absorbing Staines Youth Club FC. on the way. The club was elected to the Surrey Intermediate League (Western) in 1967 and after a season of consolidation, soon worked their way through to the Premier Division, winning an assortment of League and Cup honours on the way. In 1976, Ashford enjoyed their best season, winning the League by a substantial margin.

Although the championship eluded the club in following seasons, it usually finished in the top four and prior to season 1982-83 an invitation was extended by Surrey County F.A. to become founder members of the Surrey County Premier League, and the invitation was readily accepted. Almost from the start, the club had aspirations to acquire its own ground and after one or two disappointments, this was achieved in August 1985, when a long lease was signed with Spelthorne Borough Council, enabling the club to move to its present home at Short Lane, Stanwell. From what was nothing more than a field, the facilities were quickly developed, with the first match at Short Lane taking place in February 1986.

For geographical and historical reasons, Ashford affiliate to both Middlesex and Surrey F.A.'s, and in 1989-90, their last season as an Intermediate club, they reached the final of both County Premier Cup competitions, beating Farnham Town in the Surrey version but losing to Willesden Hawkeye in the Middlesex final. The runners-up spot in the League was also secured and the club joined the Combined Counties League, senior status

having been granted in May 1990. During its ten year membership of the Combined Counties, the club never finished below sixth place, and after finishing 3rd and 2nd in seasons 1992-93 and 1993-94, it went on to win the League Championship for four successive seasons. A fifth championship in just six seasons was secured in 1999-00, along with the Middlesex Charity Cup, the first ever senior county cup honour. Ashford moved into the Ryman League for season 2000-01 and by finishing in 3rd place, secured promotion to Division 2 at the first attempt.

In 2004-05 the club joined the Southern League for the first time, and the 4th Qualifying Round of the FA Cup was reached for the first time. The play-offs were reached but resulted in a narrow defeat at Evesham United after extra time. But a year later Ashford went one better, finishing second in Division One West of the Southern League, to secure promotion to Step 3.

This brought about a return to the Ryman League and in the following season they won the Isthmian League Cup. In 2008-09 Ashford had a thrilling 3-2 win over Woking to win the Surrey Senior Cup. After finishing in a Ryman Premier relegation spot, the club were relegated and placed in Division One Central of the Southern League; although they were offered a late reprieve from relegation after Merthyr Tydfil were liquidated, the club declined to take it and started the 2010-11 season in Division One Central.

In 2011-12 the club won both the Middlesex Senior Charity Cup (beating Northwood on penalties after a 4-4 draw) and the Aldershot Senior Cup (defeating Badshot Lea 3-1 in the final). The 2013-14 saw the club finish bottom of Division One Central, resulting in relegation back to the Combined Counties League. After finishing third in the Premier Division in their first season back in the league, they were runners-up in 2015-16 and were promoted back to Division One Central of the Southern League. The following season saw the club win the Middlesex Senior Charity Cup for the third time, beating Wealdstone 2-1 in the final. For the current season, the club were transferred to the Bostik League South Central Division.

Tuesday 6th November 2001 Ashford Town (Middx) 0 Northwood 5

eventeen years ago, almost to the day, Northwood enjoyed their highest victory against Ashford Town (we won't dwell on their visit to Northwood Park in September last year!)

The Woods gained this impressive five-goal Middlesex Senior Cup victory at Short Lane; Ashford Town were then in Isthmian League division two, whilst Northwood were playing a division higher.

The visitors were two up within just ten minutes. and this County Cup tie proved to be a cruise for Northwood, who played some delightful football on a rather cold evening.

Steve Hale (pictured) and the pacy Scott Fitzgerald had a rare excursion playing up front together for Woods, and after just seven minutes, Ryan Ashe floated over a free-kick for Gary Williams to stoop and head home at the far post. Just three minutes later, a through pass seemed to heading for goalkeeper Simon Kent but it took a strange bounce and Scott Fitzgerald was able to nick it off him and steer the ball into an empty net. Ashford rallied, with the tricky Andy Frost getting in a swirling shot which Paul Riordan did well to get behind and stop.

After 20 minutes another good sweeping move saw Dave Sargent send over a superb curling cross and Andy Cook's lunge saw him deflect the ball just wide. The pressure continued, with Ashford looking second best in most areas but the third goal did not come until five minutes before half-time.

Ith Shahid Khan withdrawing his interest in purchasing Wembley Stadium recently, many felt it was another door being slammed shut in the face of grassroots football, with the lower levels of the game set to benefit financially had the national stadium been sold to the Jacksonville Jaguars and Fulham owner.

I myself was always sceptical of the sale, mainly because I questioned whether the figures that were being bandied about would actually go back into grassroots football – there were far too many other people in the queue wanting their slice of the pie.

But the non-sale has irked people because they saw this as a great opportunity for the FA to actively do something for the grassroots game, and let's face it, something needs to be done because some



of the statistics make for grim reading whether it's 67 per cent of pitches deemed not to be of 'adequate' quality or the startling lack of 3G facilities in the UK compared to other European nations.

Those who opposed the sale believe more Football League and Premier League clubs should be helping out, and that we should not need to sell Wembley to inject funds into grassroots. But the FA doesn't have the power to instruct clubs to do that.

and this is where the government must step in because they have neglected the game and simply passed the buck to others. They are almost saying: this is your problem, sell your house and all the furniture and be done with it!

The money from the Wembley sale, even if it had come down to the lower levels of the game, would merely have served as a plaster on an open wound.

Measures must be put in place to ensure more money comes down from the Premier League, whether through taxes on a player's wage or a percentage of an agent's fee.

By selling Wembley and giving the grassroots game a chunk of the money, it is only ignoring the continued impact the Premier League should be having on the development of the game in this country. There are success stories of them helping out, but let's not begin to kid ourselves: they aren't doing anywhere near enough.

Northwood needed to find something before the break and they weren't far away as Nyariki shot narrowly wide after Dickson combined with Lucan to create the opening. But Woods weren't to be denied as they levelled the tie on 40 minutes, Newton arriving at the back post to convert Lucan's corner for his first goal for the club.

The visitors would have been relieved to go into the half-time break on level terms. But it wasn't to be as Newton conceded a stoppage time freekick in a dangerous position by the corner flag, and Sheldrick failed to deal with Henry's delivery, allowing Jack Ainsley to head home at the far post to restore the Seasiders' lead.

Woods came out with renewed vigour after the break and Dickson began to make inroads down the left flank, twice firing low balls across the face of goal with Lucan unable to get the vital touch. The visitors had a decent shout for a penalty waved away after Melford-Rowe was impeded, the Woods striker's case perhaps not helped by having gone down a little easily under a previous challenge early in the game.

After some substititions, Woods switched to a back three and pushed Tring into attack as a last ditch attempt to rescue the tie and the defender turned striker sent a half-volley over the bar when a square ball to Clarke might have been the better option. Northwood continued to press but to no avail and the match was put to bed a minute from time as Francis picked up the loose ball and sent a 20-yard strike beyond Sheldrick to complete the scoring and book the Seasiders' place in the next round.



Immense tragedy in football world last Saturday

t is hard to think of too many comparable days that encapsulate the immense tragedy in the football world as last Saturday.

Maybe in the dark days of the 1980s where football hooliganism and the underbelly of racism were synonymous with the game we hold dear – an ugly abscess that came so tragically to a head with the trio of football tragedies in the shape of Bradford, Hillsborough and Heysel.

They showed the game needed to reform and thankfully it did, but Saturday provided a reminder of the precariousness of human life.

Most of us do not give a second thought to things of that nature. Perhaps we're avoiding the existential dread synonymous with such things.

But last Saturday – any other normal football Saturday – was unfortunately overshadowed first by the news of Glenn Hoddle's heart attack at the BT Sport studios. At the time of writing, thankfully his condition has stabilised and everyone in the game was united in sending their best wishes to his family. Hopefully he makes a full recovery.

A superstar of his era, sadly other matters have overshadowed Hoddle in the public eye – most infamously in the incident that brought his stint as England manager to a close in the late 90s.

Yet it is hard to ignore the respect that he still holds by those in the game – especially from those of a Tottenham and Chelsea persuasion. As many rightly point out, that's no mean feat!

And then once we had digested the tragic news of a Brighton fan passing away on the day Glenn Murray's 100th Seagulls goal downed Wolves, we had another tragedy on our hands.

The helicopter of Leicester chairman Vichai Srivaddhanaprabha crashed outside the King Power Stadium after their game with West Ham. At the time of writing the news is scarce but it doesn't look too promising for those five individuals on board.

This incident, as Sam Matterface and others highlighted, fell just over 22 years to the day that Matthew Harding was killed in a similar helicopter accident on the way back from a game at Bolton.

The collective outpouring of support and togetherness transcends the game that so often pits us against one another. Humanity trumps the tribalism of football.

It is astonishing really that those incidents occurred on a day that for Northwood fans was hitherto dominated by the shock news of Dean Barker's departure from Chestnut Avenue.

Without receipt of the facts I can only do my best to surmise why this once promising relationship might have soured to the point of no return, but to do so would be unwise.

No doubt the protagonists have their reasons and if parting company was indeed the best outcome then we must trust the decisions of those who have the unenviable task of making them.

However, that doesn't diminish the sadness the news brought – at least from a largely outsider's point of view like mine.

Barker was a breath of fresh air and looked like a perfect fit for what the club were trying to do on and off the pitch.

He embraced the youth ethos that has made Northwood such a special community club and actively took steps to ensure there was a greater pathway and connectivity between the youth set-up and the senior side.

From the games I witnessed he had the team playing good football and on the cusp of the play-off places which, as is well documented, on a budget like Northwood's is not to be sniffed at.

Then there was the brief FA Cup run the club enjoyed with a first win in the competition for three years, the call-up of two players to an England representative side and the improvements he facilitated on and off the park.

Ultimately, then, the sudden news of his departure was both a shock and a difficult one to swallow owing to the strides being taken.

Sure there were hiccups, too. Consistency was at times an issue and losing top scorer James Ewington a difficult but not insurmountable obstacle to overcome.

And Barker would be first to recognise that he used an awful lot of players and many more were registered who barely saw the field – a number that is, if one is to cast a critical eye, ultimately unsustainable.

But in many respects that magnifies the excellent job he had done to use his contacts and bring in so many young players who bought into what he wanted to do and embraced the club in the process.

Change is inevitable and in non-league football is expected. The turnover is always high and the Simon Lane departure last season highlighted the precaution required when getting carried away with the merits of a project.

However, with Barker, he seemed to be

doing so much right. There was a belief in conversations that I had with him that this was a relationship that could grow and be strengthened.

Where the Woods go from here is chiefly the prerogative of lan Barry and the committee. No doubt they are already working quickly to identify a successor.

The pathway in recent years has been to appoint young or rookie managers, so it will be interesting to see whether the formula stays the same.

But on a day of immense tragedy we had a reminder of what matters. And Barker's departure paled into insignificance despite the disappointment it generated.

A powerful long-range effort from Mclean was saved by Luke Sheldrick but not out of harm's way, with the ball falling straight to Tyreke Leslie, who managed to finish from a very tight angle.

After 19 minutes, the Woods showed signs of getting back into the game with Ryan Ashe beginning to threaten. He won a free-kick just outside the box and Wayne Carter curled a shot only just wide of the post. oday we continue with our popular feature where we look back to events here at Northwood Park from exactly a decade ago.

The Woods had made a pretty good start to the season with just three defeats from their opening ten league matches and though an exit from the FA Cup at the first hurdle, losing at home to the Metropolitan Police had been a disappointment, there had been success in the FA Trophy with a victory over Whyteleafe.



Having lost a tough midweek game at Thamesmead Town, next up, on Saturday 11th October 2008, was a trip to Maldon Town and Manager Colin Payne was still having to shuffle his injury-hit squad with Rodney Hicks returning from a spell at St Albans City to make a start on the left flank. Danny Power replaced the injured Lee Holland at right-back while Abdul Yoki paired up with Otis Williams up front. Two other players had joined on work experience from St. Albans to make up the numbers on the bench – midfielder Craig Mortimer and striker Inih Effiong.

However, the lack of first choice players didn't affect the Woods dominance of the first-half as Michael Gordon caused havoc on the right-flank, combining well on several occasions with Power to play some accurate crosses into the box. Hicks went close early on with a downward header that was scrambled of the line and Yoki put a free header wide. Anthony



Page also headed over, Williams had a shot well blocked by the oncoming 'keeper while Yoki then rattled the crossbar with a fierce strike. The home side looked dangerous on the break though and James Robinson saw one effort cleared off the line by Danny Murphy while putting another chance into the sidenetting.

But the deserved goal never arrived for the Woods and just two minutes into the secondhalf, an uncharacteristic mistake at the back from Richard Orlu presented Jack West with an easy chance and Maldon were suddenly in front. Heads appeared to drop a little as the Woods struggled to get back on top and the two youngsters were both introduced along with Rob Ursell. But it made little difference as the side had lost their way and Maldon did well to defend their slender lead. Effiong went closest with a header which wasn't far wide but overall it was a desperately disappointing second-half performance and the Woods fell to a second successive defeat in a week. Effiong never appeared for the Woods again but has had a good career in non-League football in the decade since, including at the top level and currently plays for Dover Athletic.

There was a quick chance to bounce back in a midweek home game against Cheshunt and

from injury, Rodney Hicks and Anthony Page making way for their return.

But there was the worst possible start as the match was just three minutes old when Bradley Harrison tried his luck from distance with a speculative shot and the ball floated over goalkeeper Mitch Swain and into an empty net. The Woods picked themselves up and took the game to Cheshunt as they looked for a quick equaliser. They went close with Otis Williams hitting the post with one strike and then John Christian drove another effort inches wide of the other post. Michael Gordon was again impressing on the flank and the leveller eventually came on 34 minutes when Sonner picked himself up off the floor to head home from close-range.

Unfortunately they then lost Dwane Williams to a facial injury and Cheshunt threatened again with Swain saving well at the feet of Yohance Lewis. Richard Orlu appeared to have put the Woods ahead with a near-post header converting Abdul Yoki's hanging cross but it was harshly penalised for a foul by the big man and it was still level at half-time.

The second half was more even but the

hard-working Otis Williams continued to cause problems with the Cheshunt keeper making two good stops from him and another from Christian. The Woods couldn't find a way through and had to settle for just a point but it had been a much better performance than of late.

It was back to the FA Trophy at the weekend and an away tie, pictured here, at Crowborough Athletic down in East Sussex. Ruled out again were Sean Sonner, who continued to be troubled by his hamstring problem, and Dwane Williams who failed to recover from his eye injury but also the in-form Michael Gordon. Back in were Anthony Page and Rob Ursell along with Danny Brown.

But it was time for Ursell to make an impact for the Woods and he netted his first goal for the club after only 12 minutes as he got on the end of a cut-back from Abdul Yoki to fire home with a shot that the 'keeper just failed to keep out. It was a competitive half but the Woods lost Mark Burgess with an ankle injury and he was replaced by another of the youth



team, Eric Gbio, for the second half. It was again hard-fought but the defence held strong, Mitch Swain made a couple of important saves and then, on 79 minutes, Ursell struck again to make the tie safe and earn the Woods a home game against Brackley Town in the next round.

t's that time of the year again where the FA Cup take centre stage – first round proper weekend is upon us and we await to see where this year's FA Cup shocks will be.

After a season where Lincoln City remarkably reached the quarter-final against Arsenal, last

year was a bit quieter with no Non-League representation in the third round. Although we still had some good moments to enjoy along the way. I fancy the Non-League flag to be flying high again in 2018-19, though.

It's always struck me how the Sliding Doors effect is brought into even sharper focus when it comes to the FA Cup. The ifs, buts and maybes that populate football chat after every game, can often be the difference between a money spinning run and sitting at home watching someone else enjoy one instead.

Inevitably, if a club is to have a good run then they will have had the run of the green you need to win close games. And that's the beauty of it.



Despite the best efforts of people to talk down the competition, for Non-League clubs it still feels very much alive.

You watch this season. If (when) the scalp of Football League side is claimed next weekend, the victory will soon be followed with words like, magic and romance.

And that's all good. Because that's exactly it is. But a lot of it will be centred on the argument they are ingredients that have gone missing from the competition.

For Non-League clubs I'd argue against that claim. Maybe at the latter stages for the bigger Premier League clubs, but here it's going well, thanks.

It is reason for a club to dream, can launch careers and transform long-term fortunes. Even more so with the welcome doubling of the FA Cup prize money – with the introduction of handing losing clubs some cash in the extra preliminary and preliminary rounds also making a big difference.

The FA Cup is a perfect vessel to put money into the game through results on the pitch.

Personally, I'd like to see some of the pound notes ring-fenced for clubs to use on infrastructure, equipment or ground issues.

But there has to be an appreciation that if a club wins money it is entitled to use how it sees fit. If that means bringing in a new striker to help the season, then that's their right.

Of course, for most Non-League clubs the FA Cup is already over for another year. For many it was finished at the beginning of August.

For others, just making it through a couple of rounds was success enough. I took a trip to Lymington Town for their second round qualifying clash with Torquay United. Although the Wessex League side were well beaten on the day, it was obvious to see what their slice of FA Cup history had brought the club, with an ex-Football League side at home in front of the BBC online cameras. You can be sure the interest it created would have brought in more fans.




